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What is disability?

Disability is something that happens when people with an impairment face barriers in society¹. These barriers can be physical but can also be as a result of people's perceptions of disability.

There are a number of definitions of disability. This strategy uses the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities definition for a person with a disability as follows:

Those who have long-term physical, mental, intellectual or sensory impairments which in interaction with various barriers may hinder their full and effective participation in society on an equal basis with others.

People with disabilities refer to themselves in a number of ways. Our strategy uses the term 'people with disabilities' on the advice of our reference group.

Our community

One in five (24%) people in New Zealand have a disability.

26% Maori | 19% Pasifika | 16% Asian

In Napier there is a higher proportion of people with a disability (27%), 53% are over 55, 36% are over 65 years old.

Main types of disabilities in Napier

Hearing - 5645 people - 50% are over 65 years


Physical - 9747 people - 50% are over 65 years

Psychological - 3249 people - most people are 10-14 years and 40-55 years

Vision - 2289 people - just under 50% are over 65 years

Napier's' disability community is growing

As people age, they are more likely to experience disability or chronic illness. Napier has an ageing population with one in four people expected to be over 65 years old by 2031. There will be more people with hearing and vision impairments as over 50% of people with these disabilities are over 65 years. Mobility impairment is also an issue for this age group. Access to facilities and services will continue to be an important focus for Council.



Who has been involved

Napier Disability Advisory Group

A group representing disability service providers, Napier Disability Advisory Group (NDAG), was instrumental in encouraging the Council to develop the strategy and they selected three members to be part of the strategy development team. NDAG will continue to provide advice about the strategy as it is implemented.

Napier Ability Plus

In developing this strategy we established a reference group - Napier Ability Plus (NAPs). The members are people with a lived experience of disability. NAPs has kept the strategy real and provided their insights into the focus areas. They have been a key part of the consultation to date and will continue to guide the strategy and its implementation.

Napier's disability community

It was important to talk with our disability community before developing the strategy. We held workshops for people with disabilities and one for service providers and a focus group with the deaf community. Our disability community were keen to have their say.





WAR MEMORIAL CONSULTATION SUMMARY

INTRODUCTION

The purpose of the War Memorial consultation process was to present three design concepts for a new War Memorial to the community and to invite feedback on those options, including any modifications people would make and/or to contribute new design concepts for Council to consider.

All three options to house the memorial elements are located in or within the immediate vicinity of the Napier War Memorial Centre as follows:

- Forecourt Building a memorial located on the forecourt next to the main building featuring a new separate building containing the Perpetual Flame and an outdoor area for the Roll of Honour.
- Garden an open air memorial located next to the main building at the site of the Floral Clock, incorporating the Perpetual Flame and Roll of Honour and a reflection pool.
- Indoor a memorial located within the main building housing the Perpetual Flame and Roll of Honour.

The three options were placed in the above alphabetical order on the hardcopy form and were randomised on the online form (i.e. in a different order each time the form was accessed).

Further information and visuals for each of the design concepts were detailed on the survey see <u>Appendix 1</u> for hardcopy example. Videos were included in the online material.

CONSULTATION PROCESS

A range of consultation tools were utilised to invite the community to provide feedback including meetings, presentations, community pop-ups, focus groups and digital engagement. Promotion was implemented through a variety of mechanisms including print and digital advertising, radio, billboards, media releases, website and social media. An independent survey was completed to provide a demographically representative response to the consultation matter.

The consultation period was four weeks and was undertaken from 19 November to 14 December 2018.

Key Stakeholders / Special Interest

The consultation process acknowledged the interest of those with a special interest and key stakeholders, and also sought feedback from the wider community. In developing the consultation plan, both Returned Services Associations (RSA) Presidents were contacted to ascertain their preference for consultation activities. The consultation included:

- Napier RSA
 - o A members only meeting and presentation
 - o Item in weekly e-newsletter
 - Hardcopy surveys available at RSA
 - Poster displays
- · Taradale and Districts RSA
 - o Host a community meeting and presentation
 - o Focus group with the Taradale Schools ANZAC event organising committee
 - Hardcopy surveys available at RSA
 - Poster displays

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Special interest stakeholders were contacted directly by letter and invited to provide feedback, were invited to a specific focus group, provided with information for members, or presentations made at their meetings:

- Letters to neighbouring properties, service museums, Historic Places Hawke's Bay
- Invitation to focus group to Return the Name, the Flame and the Roll of Honour Facebook group
- Information to Napier City Business Inc., Community Network distribution (community groups)
- Presentations were made at Māori Consultative Committee meeting, Napier Disability Advisory Group meeting and Napier Youth Council meeting

Community

A series of pop-ups were held in the community in the following locations:

- Marewa
- Taradale
- Anderson Park
- CBD

Hardcopy surveys were made available at Napier City Council Customer Services, Napier Library and Taradale Library in addition to the RSAs.

Independent Survey

A mixed methods approach was taken for the survey of Napier residents including telephone, online and face to face surveying. A sample size of 400 was identified as representative based on Census information. This survey was undertaken by SIL Research company, the full survey report is attached in <u>Appendix 2</u>.

RESULTS

Consultation activity rates:

Social Media

We put three boosted posts on Facebook:

- 19 November 2018 (announcing the opening of the consultation)
- 24 November 2018 (midway)
- 12 December 2018 (reminder that consultation was closing)

In total, the reach was 31,259 people. The number of 'clicks' was 4,673 and the posts were shared 41 times. The posts performed moderately well with the first post receiving the most attention.

Survey Results

The independent survey results and the online (www.sayitnapier.nz) and hardcopy results are combined. A total of 1298 people responded to the surveys. Respondents were able to select more than one option to like therefore results do not add up to 100%. Respondents reasons for liking an option and their concerns are consistent with the feedback provided at the face to face consultation activities. The results are in the table below.



A total of six drawings and one written description were received. All drawings were variations of the consultation design concepts, with two that combine indoor and outdoor locations and features. The variations are summarised as follows:

Garden variations


 Changes to improve accessibility for wheelchair users, provide extra seating for the elderly and suggestions for design features, materials and plantings. Roll of Honour to be placed along the wheelchair 'slopes' – a "wrap around" similar to the forecourt option. See drawing below for detail




June Graham suggests in her written comment to relocate the Garden option to the forecourt, to include hedging for shelter from the wind, a roof to the pergola structure and for the Floral Clock to remain in its current position.

Indoor variations

3. Uses approximately one third of the existing storage room to create a memorial space and extends storage room by a third into the main hall. Adds features such as statues and a flagpole. See drawing below for detail – one other drawing included in Appendix 4.



4. Sites the Roll of Honour on the outer wall of the building, suggests signage options to include Building name and activity name, locates Perpetual Flame inside the building in front of windows where it can be seen from the outside. See drawing below for details.




- Provided by Craig Morley. Provides options to relocate storage without extending the building in order to accommodate the original indoor option. Storage location options as follows

Indoor / Outdoor combinations

6. Ray Blewett suggests to locate the Perpetual Flame inside in the foyer so it is easily seen from the front and side. The Roll of Honour would be placed on a new Wall of Remembrance, and the original plaques attached to two new brick memorial arches representing the two World Wars. See drawings below for details.



7. Dorothy Pilkington provided a combined concept in person and attached to a hardcopy survey. It includes using the space identified in the Indoor Design Concept, but at a reduced size (one third of the storage room) to house the plaques and new elements including art, poetry and digital technology such as touch tables (similar to those in Wairoa). A new wall adjacent and joining the main building, on the forecourt, for the Roll of Honour with a circular reflection pool is identified. The Perpetual Flame could be either elevated in the pool (within a glass or Perspex case) or in the foyer of the main building behind the wall of windows facing Marine Parade. The concept suggests a service lift from the basement be installed to keep vehicles off the forecourt allowing for the memorial elements. See drawing below for details – further drawings included in Appendix 4.



Photos

Seven photos were uploaded with online survey forms. Five were examples of other memorials including one incorporating a Perpetual Flame in the open, three modern designs – two of which use Cortene steel and the other with poppies included on a Roll of Honour. A photo of a field of poppies was provided and a 1957 photo of the Floral Clock with the Napier War Memorial Centre in the background.















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Additional feedback

Five people provided additional written feedback. These are summarized below, with the full documents attached in Appendix 4.

- At the Napier RSA members only meeting, President John Purcell read responses to the three
 options presented from Guy Natush. This was provided in writing also. Guy Natush supports
 the Forecourt option he designed for the following reasons:
 - Gives prominence to the Roll of Honour and Flame (consistent with the 1957 outside design)
 - b. Provides a sheltered place for contemplation and viewing memorabilia
 - visually and physically links the Roll of Honour and contemplation area to the 1957
 Memorial Hall
 - d. Enhances the Marine Parade landscape and add architectural value to the forecourt [with the annex building etc]

Mr Natush suggests the Garden option is unsuited for the purpose, does not improve the architectural landscape of Marine Parade and does not meet the requirements of the design brief for the War Memorial.

He suggests the Indoor option is a "a solution of expediency rather than a vision that more appropriately should commemorate the significant events of two world wars". Mr Natush says the option does highlight the need for secured, covered contemplation area to house memorabilia but that it does not support the 1957 preference to locate the memorial outside the building or recover the integrity of the 1957 design other than reinstating some windows. He also states that this option does not contribute to or enhance the architectural feature of the Marine Parade.

Supports Forecourt Building option.

2. Selwyn Hawthorne identifies his concern about the decision making processes regarding the removal the memorial elements from the building and the name change, the decision itself and subsequent Council discussions and decisions. He identified concerns with the consultation process suggesting the survey forms were not "universally available" and that asking for demographic details (Age, Gender, Ethnicity and suburb location) turned several people off. He states he had a comment made to him that the telephone survey interviewer was biased. He also raises concerns regarding the costings provided and does not necessarily accept the Forecourt option would only have access during daytime hours. Mr Hawthorne expressed concern that the Reserve Land Title for the Garden option is compromised indicating Napier City Council could put the site in "the hands of private enterprise". He supports the Forecourt option as it restores the MANA to the site and has the WOW factor that is obvious in most memorials worldwide. Mr Hawthorne suggests a Charitable Trust be set up as a fundraising vehicle for the new memorial.

Supports Forecourt Building option.

3. Jan Daffern provided feedback as she was unable to attend the Focus Group at the MTG. Her feedback supports the Indoor Design Option. She identifies that this would return the memorial elements to the building and "remove the painful memories of the recent past". Additionally, she suggests the use of information technology (similar to the WW100 Salute project in Wairoa – touch tables) along with other supporting memorabilia that would encourage a greater understanding about our people and our stories among residents and tourists. She also suggests there is an opportunity to "create synergy between the MTG, the Napier War Memorial and local history".

Supports Indoor option.

4. In support of the Indoor option, this feedback requests the reinstatement of the memorial elements to the building which will "return the building to its original status as a war memorial". It identifies that while some have expressed concern about the building being used for "commercial exploitation", future security of heritage buildings is greatly enhanced when they have an economically viable use. Further, the writer suggests including the memorial will enhance the whole Centre by adding an attractive point of interest and that the conference centre can comfortably co-exist with the War Memorial. Comment is made on the cost of the option including provision of an alternative storage area when it is larger than the current storage area and that if it were the same size as the current area, the cost of this option would be similar to the Garden option.

Supports Indoor option.

Sue MacDonald writes that she is concerned that ratepayers are paying hundreds of thousands
of dollars for a very poor Council decision. She advises she will leave the selection of the option
to "more knowledgeable and committed citizens who have a (emotional) connection to the War
Memorial and Flame".



APPENDIX 2: INDEPENDENT SURVEY





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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

An objective and independent study conducted by SIL Research collectively with Napier City Council's consultation sought residents' feedback on three possible future designs of Napier's War Memorial.

A total n=1298 of residents took part in SIL and Council surveys between November-December 2018. Information and opportunities to provide feedback were available online, at Napier libraries, Council's Customer Service Centre, and the Napier and Taradale RSAs. In addition, telephone and face-to-face interviews were conducted.

To provide an unbiased or influenced measure of public opinion all results were analysed by SIL Research using a set of statistical testing measures while reviewing data findings.



The Garden Option was the most liked across all three design options for Napier's War Memorial.

KEY MESSAGES TO CONSIDER

"As a veteran I prefer my place of remembrance and contemplation to be open, free and in touch with natural beauty. Most veterans I know are of the same mind."

[GARDEN OPTION]

"I am concerned to see that the Eternal Flame appears unprotected from vandalism and the weather. Would like to see some clear roofing over part of the area." [GARDEN OPTION]

"This is the best option as it restores the role of Honour and eternal Flame within the War Memorial building, they're meant to be together. Also, it protects them from vandals and enables the addition of modern technology with interactive history of the people honoured [...]"

[INDOOR OPTION]

"Not easily seen or accessible enough" [INDOOR OPTION]

"There are parts of it that appeal, but the cost is phenomenal." [FORECOURT OPTION]



METHODOLOGY

BACKGROUND AND OBJECTIVES

In 2016, due to major redevelopment, the Napier War Memorial Conference Centre was closed moving the perpetual flame and Roll of Honour into storage.

At the end of 2018, Napier City Council (NCC) sought residents' feedback on options for a 'new look' War Memorial.

NCC held a consultation for three possible future designs of Napier's War Memorial. The consultation closed on December 14, 2018. Information and opportunities to provide feedback were available online and at Napier libraries, Council's Customer Service Centre, and the Napier and Taradale RSAs.

In addition, SIL Research was asked to conduct an independent survey for Napier City Council to provide an objective, unbiased measure of public opinion with regards to the War Memorial to ensure accurate resident representation.

QUESTIONNAIRE

SIL Research together with NCC developed a War Memorial questionnaire. The questionnaire went through several iterations before a final version was tested and agreed to for use.

Each design option provided a full concept description and an image (when completing the survey online and through the SIL survey). In addition, videos offering people a virtual experience of each concept were available via NCC's website.

The presentation order of all three design options were randomized for each respondent.

DATA COLLECTION

SIL Research conducted a survey between 21 November-14 December 2018. To leverage the strengths of each collection method and to offset the weaknesses of others, SIL Research used a

mixed methods approach (telephone, online and face-to-face) to collect surveys across Napier residents.

To introduce a statistically robust sampling methodology, SIL Research determined that a sample size of n=400 be used, based on Statistics New Zealand usually resident population figures from the 2013 Census.

PROJECT SPECIFICS

In recent months Napier War Memorial became a topic of community discussion with several groups working to influence public opinion in favour of their preferred option. To avoid potentially biased results SIL Research implemented several data collection methodologies:

- continuously changing the online survey link address to avoid sharing within a group of people, and
- excluding multiple responses coming from the same person.

DATA ANALYSIS

A total of n=512 responses were collected by SIL and n=400 were used in the final analysis. Multiple online survey responses coming from allegedly the same person, incomplete responses, and respondents outside of NCC's catchment area were removed from the analysis.

Respondents were asked what suburb they lived in, age, gender and ethnicity demographics. This was primarily to ensure that the final sample was generally representative of the city as a whole.

Data was weighted to reflect area gender and age group proportions as determined by Statistics New Zealand 2013 Census.

In addition, SIL Research received two Excel files containing 'Say it Napier' online responses (total n=548) and paper-based surveys (total n=350) collected by NCC. Council's data was used as is without additional alteration.

SIL Research provided a combined, independent analysis of data collected by Council using a set of statistical testing while reviewing data findings.

Chi-square tests were used when comparing group results in tables. The threshold for reporting any statistically significant differences was a p-value of 0.05 (corresponding to a confidence level of 95%). Where differences were outside this threshold (less than 95%), no comments were made; where differences were within this threshold, comments have been made within the context of their practical relevance to NCC.

NOTES ON REPORTING

Percentages may not add up to 100% due to rounding and multiple-answer questions.

Not all respondents answered all questions as respondents were able to skip over some questions in self-competed surveys.

All open-ended comments were categorised. Totals may exceed 100% owing to multiple issues for each comment.

'No answers' were excluded from the final analysis.

The final sample size for this study was n=1298, which gives a maximum margin of error of +/-2.68% at the 95% confidence interval.










- Overall, the Garden option was the most liked across all three design options; two-thirds of Napier residents liked this option (65.5%).
- This result was similar between both Council's (63.8%) and SIL's (68.9%) findings with no statistically significant differences.
- One-third of Napier residents (32.6%) liked the Indoor option. Again, it was similar between Council (32.7%) and SIL (32.6%) results.
- The least favourable design was the Forecourt; just over one-quarter of Napier residents (28.0%) liked this option.



Overall results by age, gender and area




- The Garden option was popular amongst different age, gender and area groups.





Overall results by age, gender and area




- The Indoor option gained 32.6% positive responses (32.9% less than the Garden option) and was the second most liked option.




Residents' comments



Overall results by age, gender and area













- Overall, 61.0% of surveyed residents said they 'knew something' about Napier's War Memorial, whereas 28.1% 'knew nothing' and a small percent of residents (10.9%) 'knew a lot'.
- The level of initial knowledge showed no influence on the likeliness to choose a Forecourt option.
- However, residents with initially limited or no knowledge at all were more likely to choose the Garden option, and those who knew a lot more likely to choose the Indoor option.



IN ADDITION TO THE KEY DESIGN QUESTIONS, SIL RESEARCH ASKED ALL RESPONDENTS: "NAPIER CITY COUNCIL IS SEEKING YOUR FEEDBACK AND COMMENT ON OPTIONS FOR NAPIER'S WAR MEMORIAL. In March 2016 the Napier War Memorial Hall ceased operations in order to renovate and earthquake strengthen the existing building to new criteria following the Christchurch Earthquake. This work was undertaken by Gemco Construction of Hastings to a design by Brent Scott an architect from Citrus Design Architecture, a Napier company. In addition to the strengthening, the plan included expanding the original building and adding a new exhibition area to the complex. At a cost in the vicinity of \$7.5million the work was completed in March 2017 for an official opening on the 23rd of that month. A public "Open Day" was scheduled for a week later on April 1st.

And what an April Fools stunt to pull on the ratepayers and public of Napier.

Little did we know that our original hallowed structure that had been in its previous iteration the seat of profound MANA, honoured by the whanau and friends of firstly the original 303 Napier persons who lost their lives fighting on/in mostly on foreign sea, soil and air in the Second World War and then from 1995 the additional 305 names from the Boer and First World War from an expanded area who never returned and who contributed so valiantly to ensure the peaceful and democratic lifestyle that we enjoy today.

From the closure in 2016 until the re-opening in 2017 Napier City Councillors and Senior staff completely lost their moral compass. Behind the scenes during this period there were moves within Council to relocate the memorial component of this sacrosanct building.

Hang on! This shrine has all of the MANA associated with a memorial, as detailed in the United Kingdom Memorials Trust protocols that apply in this country," a site intended to perpetuate in a permanent manner the memory of an event in New Zealand history".

There were documented utterances to justify Council's decisions such as

"The War Memorial Conference Centre has in the past created marketing issues, particularly with Australian potential clients at trade shows who perceive that the facility is like a Leagues Club or Returned Services club rooms." and for the removal of Memorial elements because of "budget constraints." Each of these inane comments from elected councillors and/or staff ensured that the Eternal Flame, the War Memorial name had no attachment whatsoever to what I now describe as the biggest lemon in Napier's history.

These elements are in some cases are the only recognition of those who served and were now suddenly not part of OUR MEMORIAL.

This MEMORIAL (a structure that in any culture is expected to honour its kaupapa in perpetuity) was created from generous and ingenious contributions totalling £21,000 from a much more egalitarian and grateful community, from the business houses of the day, from service and sports clubs that came together with the unique Hawkes Bay's community spirit that is now diminishing so quickly. The funds raised locally were matched pound for pound (£12,000) by the Government of the day, and a top-up of £10,000 from the Napier Borough Council.

BUT WAIT, THERE IS MORE!

THE APOLOGY;

At a council meeting where the name of the Memorial building was on the Agenda on 9th April 2018 Mayor Bill Dalton made the following statement;

"To those people who were offended I unreservedly apologise. There was no intent to offend." $\label{eq:continuous}$

Being a generous person I have decided to assume that the apology also applied to the elements of the absent Plaques and the Perpetual Flame that are still in storage in the NCC yard in Onekawa and when I was granted permission to see them on February 8th 2018 they were in the respectful care of storeman Kerry Kilbey.

In order to give solace to those hallowed names on that day I read a prepared prayer and left a copy of it under the plastic wrapping. These Plaques with 606 names on them are not forgotten by decent citizens of Napier and we are coming to get you, to honour you and to bring you into the day, the night, the sun, the rain and the eternal spray from our foreshore that you have been disrespectfully denied for far too long.

After New Zealand's second worst wartime loss of 2779 lives on the slopes at Gallipoli in 1915, the victor of that sad battle, Mustapha Kemal Ataturk gave considerable solace to New Zealand families when he communicated

"Those heroes that shed their blood and lost their lives. You are now lying in the

soil of a friendly country, therefore rest in peace. There is no difference between the Johnnies and the Mehmets to us where they lie side by side here in this country of ours. You, the Mothers who sent your sons from faraway places, wipe away your tears, your sons are lying in our bosom and are in peace after having lost their lives on this land, they have become our sons." These heart-rending words of comfort attributed to Ataturk, Commander of Turkish forces in World War 1 and later Father of the New Turkey, grace Memorials on 3 continents. Surely, WE, the vanquished of that debacle can offer real solace to the now 1000 lost sons and daughters of Napier. If our arch enemy at Gallipoli can show such grace to our dead on his shores it is incumbent upon us to do our utmost to bring the memorials out of the dark to a place where their whanau can spend their time in solace with their Tipuna.

WE WILL RESTORE YOUR MANA.

Where to from here;

My connection to the Napier War Memorial Hall goes right back to 1955 when I helped my parents during the original fundraising by running around selling raffle tickets in our neighbourhood and outside Kidson's Menswear in Emerson Street on a Friday night. Prior to my recent visit to see the plaques I had had discussions with Jeremy Nash who lost his Father in an air accident during training for overseas service in 1942 from memory. Jeremy is the Grandson of Sir Walter Nash, former Prime Minister of NZ, and the promoter of the original legislation that created the subsidised government funding of memorials to commemorate the fallen of the 1939-1942 conflict.

Since I retired in 2004 much of my time has been directed toward assisting my community on a voluntary basis with projects large and small that have had fundraising, construction, security, traffic, crowd control and marshalling components.

For the current War Memorial solution I have developed a plan based on a previous \$1.5 million project that I led for Little Elms Charitable Trust in

Hastings in 2008 where the local transport industry through Trucking For Hawkes Bay Child Cancer Charitable Trust had built, adjacent to the Hastings

Fallen Soldiers Memorial Hospital, a Ronald McDonald House style accommodation complex for parents of sick children who are patients there.

My Napier War Memorial plan requires the establishment of a Charitable Trust with its tax deduction benefits as a fundraising vehicle. The impetus for this was that when I was undertaking my petition in August/ September 2017 I heard numerous comments from many of the 846 signatories that they were prepared to put their hand in their pocket to assist in restoring a *WOW FACTOR* Memorial to the site. This plan has scope for known strategic partners, (both cultural and financial), cash contributing, material and skill supplying organisations as well as a community involvement. Jeremy and I presented this proposal to NCC staffers Sally Jackson and Charles Ropotini in 2 meetings in early 2018. At that point we were unanimous in giving our unequivocal support for Guy Natusch's beautiful forecourt concept or any variation that he agreed to. We have not had one communication in response to this tried and proven community solution.

Current concerns;

- (1) A principal fear that I have of the consultation process is that the Napier War Memorial survey forms were not universally available.
- (2) I think that the survey form didn't need to include the first section regarding "Your details" This served to turn off several people who have contacted me,
- (3) Additionally a comment that was passed on to me with regard to the telephone polling undertaken was that the interviewer gave the impression following two answers to questions that she was not neutral/independant.
- (4) I have a further grave concern that the Reserve land title for the Garden Option is compromised and that history has shown that NCC can and has carved off structures and put them in the hands of private enterprise such as Ocean Spa. I would have to create absolute mayhem if the War Memorial site was treated similarly in a deal with a major hotel organisation such as Te

- (5) Based on my observance of most of the the issues of the first 2 years of this the 45th Council I have little faith in the transparency that has been shown on too many occasions during that period,
- (6) I have grave concerns as to the reliance on skewed costings attributed to the options that Council has printed in the Napier War Memorial survey that is currently in the public arena. But I must state that the total business plan charges for the Aquarium expansion, the new Pool complex and the money spent on the Velodrome white elephant were combined, they would be greater than the revised cost of the partially subsidised Natusch Forecourt Building Option,
- (7) I don't necessarily accept that The Natusch Forecourt Building Option would only have access during daytime hours,
- (8) In my opinion cost is the last consideration in the restoration of a fitting Memorial to those 1000 citizen of our Borough who forewent their tomorrows for our todays. To me there is an old adage that is so important;

"To care for those who once cared for us is one of the highest honours."

Summary;

I, Selwyn Hawthorne, a 76 year resident of Napier and surrounding districts unequivocally support Guy Natusch's Forecourt Building Option as the restored Memorial to replace the formal Plaques and Eternal Flame that were disrespectfully not returned when the Napier War Memorial Centre was strengthened and renovated in 2016/17.

I do support this because of;

- (1) its ability to restore the MANA to the 61 year old sacrosanct site, and what it means to the whanau of 1000+ young Napier and District men and women who gave their tomorrows for our todays in many theatres of war worldwide,
- (2) its beauty, grace, style and connection to the original design that was so loved by Napier citizens who cared,
- (3) its WOW FACTOR that is obvious in most Memorials worldwide,

- (4) its opportunity to be re-connected to the community via a proven funding and construction plan that Napier City were given but have to date ignored,
- (5) its future capability to install current technology of the day to display more data that could be retrieved on the persons named,
- (6) Being an outside environment available 24/7 for the Plaques a sacred space for those who so deserve to be honoured and who have for too long been denied the opportunity to be warmed by the light of day, to be able to rest in the dark, to be washed by gentle showers and to smell the spray of our dear ocean, and to have their whanau sit with them, to honour them and to weep at the appalling waste of humanity that they were the victims of.

War Memorial Reinstatement

To whom it may concern,

Napier City Councilors, R.S.A and others Cc: HB Today

A critique of three options in summary;

Option 1: Forecourt Option

A vision that aims to, and achieves the following:

- Respect the prominence of the Roll Of Honour and Flame in the original 1957 design, which
 was outside and prominent as the visitor approached the War Memorial.
- To provide a sheltered space for contemplation and viewing of displays selected from memorabilia for their compelling interest and educational value.
- To both visually and physically link and reunite the Roll Of Honour and contemplation area to the original 1957 Memorial Hall as would be recommended by ICOMOS and other guidelines.
- Enhance the Marine Parade landscape with the War Memorial Roll Of Honour and contemplation extension being a feature of architectural value to the forecourt and as a culminating feature as viewed from the Soundshell and fountain.

The dome and Spire of Peace would be a visual point of interest in the landscape and a reminder that our aim should be always to achieve peace without the horrors of war.

Note: The architects have endeavored to work within the guidelines of ICOMOS and the other heritage agencies. An independent evaluation would be welcome by an experienced conservation architect.

Option 2: Garden Option

- This concept is quite unsuited for the purpose.
- The attractive presentation focuses on the views from the Soundshell and fountain, only
 emphasizes the criticisms reported to council and others in the earlier report 17 October 2018
 (enclosed). There are many fundamental design problems and does nothing to improve the
 architectural landscape of the Marine Parade.

Note: This proposal does not even meet the requirements of the design brief mutually accepted by the Napier City Council (NCC) and myself as Heritage Advisor. This concept lacks the vision for the memorial to be more than a landscaped cemetery. The concept required is for the vision to properly acknowledge the significant events of two world wars. This option fails to do that.

Option 3: Indoor Option

- This option has highlighted the need for a collection area for memorabilia and display if there
 were to be no secure covered contemplation area.
- The proposal to house the plaques for World War 1 and World War 2 inside is not supported
 for two reasons. Firstly, the preferred location at all times from 1957 was outside the building,
 and secondly, the location nominated is not appropriate for such significant events as the two
 world wars.

This proposal does not contribute or enhance the architectural features of the Marine Parade, nor does it recover the integrity of the 1957 memorial other than reinstatement of some windows.

Note: It is a solution of expediency rather than a vision that more appropriately should commemorate the significant events of two world wars.

The Napier War Memorial – is Napier City Council missing a unique opportunity?

One key reason why Napier attracts as many visitors as it does could be because of its history and the stories it can share and tell. Art Deco Napier is a prime example of this. However, there is a parallel between 1930s Art Deco Napier and the post-war period of the 1950s when the Napier War Memorial was built. During both eras Napier's community shared emotional values by looking forward to a brighter, better future with buildings and memorials that would also act as constant reminders of past traumas and tragedies.

When the Napier War Memorial was built in 1957, Guy Natusch's design was a creative innovation because it also integrated the value of memorial and remembrance. More than that, where war had sometimes divided communities apart, the Napier War Memorial building was specifically built for joyful celebrations and events that would bring communities back together again. Recent history, post 2016, has revealed a different story that has tainted this idealism.

In my opinion, not only is the name the Napier Conference Centre bland and boring, very much like the re-build itself, it also possibly excludes communities who may want to use the building for events other than for a 'conference'. More than that, whilst the name Napier Conference Centre persists, and the perceived theft of the War Memorial remains; what may continue is an indelible stain which may become extremely difficult to remove.

Therefore, the option to place some or all of the elements of memorial back inside The Napier War Memorial building could be a great leap forward and in time remove the painful memories of the recent past.

What to do next and what else could be placed inside the building should also be discussed and considered. To digress for a moment, every Anzac Day most of us are enthralled by the fact that a growing number of children and young adults attend and learn from the commemorations that take place on that day; and quite rightly so. Imagine if the Napier War Memorial building was to contain an ever-changing display of actual memorial artefacts and objects and made full use of information technology as well. Within a safe and peaceful environment young people, residents and tourists would be able to discover and understand much more about our people and our stories. Not just on Anzac Day but virtually every day we would be able to remember them.

As far as the use of information technology is concerned we only have to look up the road to Wairoa for an idea. Wairoa's WW100 project called SALUTE is the country's first digital World War I memorial. Like a giant iPad it operates with the touch of a finger, Wairoa's touchable screens feature maps, diaries, letters from the battlefields, films and two interactive timelines.

Is Napier City Council missing a unique opportunity to create synergy between the MTG, the Napier War Memorial and local history? With the use of actual objects, articles, art work and poetry and the application of modern technology, placed within the War Memorial building, Napier could honour, respect and showcase the lives of those who served overseas. Indeed, there are possibly hundreds of untold wartime stories, which could enlighten and educate communities both now and way into the future.

Napier War memorial Indoor Option

I support the Indoor Option.

We need to recall that the building is the War Memorial Centre which was originally built as a war memorial back in 1957. The City Council was entrusted with the care of the War Memorial and has seriously failed in its duty in removing the war memorial elements from the building during the recent renovations. We now have the opportunity to reinstate the war memorial elements in the building which will return the building to its original status as a war memorial.

Commercial Considerations: I am aware that some local residents are concerned about what they see as commercial exploitation of the war memorial by using it as a conference centre. As an honorary life member of Heritage New Zealand I am well aware that the future security of heritage buildings is greatly enhanced when they have an economically viable use. There is no reason why the war memorial cannot co-exist with the conference centre. However I note that in the "Design Concepts" documents released by the Council that the indoor Option "impacts on the operation of the conference centre". What the impact is is not specified but it appears that the Council needs reminding that that there seems no good reason why the conference centre cannot comfortably coexist with the war memorial as evidently was the case prior to the last renovations. In fact the war memorial section of the building will enhance the whole centre in providing an attractive point of interest.

Cost Considerations: The Indoor Option is potentially the cheapest option at around \$385,000 plus consultants' and consent fees. However this net cost has been unduly inflated by the estimated cost of providing an alternative storage area in the building. The proposed new storage area adds a further \$320,000 plus fees to the cost. While it might be argued that a space must be provided for storage displaced by the indoor memorial space it should be noted that the proposed new storage space is considerably larger than the pace it replaces at 97 m² versus about 70m². While there may be good reasons for providing a new larger space it is unreasonable to add the extra cost of the larger new space to the Indoor Option cost. If the storage space replacement cost were adjusted to cover the direct replacement of the 70m² taken for the war memorial elements the net cost of the Indoor Option would then be about \$740,000 or very similar to the Garden Option which does not include the cost of reinstating the floral clock in the sunken garden.

As a rate payer I am sadly reminded that if the City Council had been in a position to fund the renovation project as originally designed this would have probably been the cheapest and best option as the saving of a million dollars or so made at the time will ultimately be gobbled up by the cost of one of the current proposals plus all the preparatory work to bring us to this stage. We will also be left with a building where the cost of the original economies will continue to detract from its design.

Memorial design - feedback

This Memorial design feedback supports only the Indoor design option, using existing floor space within the existing building.

The Memorial elements, the Flame and Roll of Honour have always been part of the existing building. The elements should never have been removed in the first instance. The Ministry of Culture and Heritage key source reference "ICOMOS" requires reinstatement to the existing building.

The Garden and Forecourt designs are NEW memorials, separate to the original Memorial building and do not comply with the intent of Government of 1957, that the building's purpose first and foremost be a War Memorial. The local body accepted this as caretaker and they were responsible for the upkeep and to ensure this primary purpose was maintained.

NCC have failed in this respect and this needs to be corrected by re-instatement of the Memorial elements <u>back</u> into the building.

The original indoor option adopted by Council on 2nd October 2018 has raised potential design issues around fire safety and storage.

Initial fire safety checks by Strata Group indicate that a egress path is required and the Hallway provides this function and hence cannot be removed, however it appears that they were not informed that a new/replacement fire egress path would be through the (new) Memorial room area. This needs to be assessed properly with a qualified Fire safety Engineer.


If the fire exit hallway cannot be converted to storage space, then new storage area has to be created.

NCC amended the Indoor design, to include a new **97m2** storage extension on the North East aspect of the building. It is significantly more storage area than is currently available. It will dramatically affect the external appearance/outline of the building and this area is one of the last remaining unspoiled areas that have form, character and original architecture.

It is unrealistic and not required given there are existing areas within the building that could be converted to additional storage space.

It comes with a hefty price tag as well. Referring to the recent RLB costing report;

Option C1 Store room extension = \$320,000 Consultants fees = \$125,000



WMC Walkthrough & ergonomics

On $19^{\text{th}}\,$ November 2018, there was walkthrough of the War Memorial Centre to identify the storage issues.

Having worked for Ericsson as a Production Engineer on electronic assembly lines, I am very familiar with the importance of process control and efficient flow paths. Inefficiencies generally result from;

- unnecessarily long travel distances
- poor accessibility of items
- · crossovers (potential collisions!)
- inappropriate sequencing of tasks

It was blatantly obvious that the Conference operations were significantly impacted by the first two points.

My impression was that there are significant operational issues moving chairs and tables around the building with the existing *single* storage room configuration.

Using the Foyer as a wait and staging area while items have to be moved to/from the existing storage room to either of exhibition halls via the Ballroom and Gallery, is not efficient. There are long travel paths and interference with other operations.

As an example, if the Large Exhibition Hall is being used and has to be rearranged/refurnished (and guests are temporarily moved into the Foyer), the Main Ballroom, Gallery, Lounge AND the Small Exhibition Hall cannot be in use.

Booking and income potential that is not being realized.

Having a storage area between the Large and Small Exhibition Halls $\underline{\text{in addition}}$ to a storage area over near the Main Ballroom would resolve this operational issue.

Utilizing the building's existing space for new storage is the best option.

This needs to be considered before any external changes to the building are made to secure additional storage area.

Storage options

1. Basement

The 2016 Brent Scott design originally included a large basement storage area and service elevator to cater for storage needs (plans over page). The Architect recognized that at least two storage spaces were required and one of these needed to be accessed <u>between</u> the Large and small exhibition halls.

Attached is the agenda of the Memorial build cost cutting

[CO_20160406_AGN_112_AT_SUP_SAVED]. The cost cutting changes saved ~\$1.3 million, the bulk of this the removal of the Memorial elements annex and the Basement storage/elevator.


Obviously the annex removal has resulted in no location for the Memorial elements. The removal of the lift/basement meant there would be no service access for exhibition hall loading and unloading at basement level and service vehicles would be forced to using the forecourt. This was a significant safety compromise because this is a busy pedestrian and foot traffic area.

It meant there could be no obstacles on the forecourt – no trees (there used to be Pohutakawa trees). Its lifeless and stark looking now.

The forecourt has turned into an ugly looking car park and vehicles using the Marine parade are using it as a turnaround area.

The money saved back in 2016 now needs to be reinvested back into the building to resolve these existing issues. It will unfortunately, now cost more to reinstate, but this really needs to be implemented sooner rather than later.





2. Existing G38/G32/G37/G31 floor space

There are existing areas between the large and small exhibition Halls that could be better utilized.

- a. Original layout
- b. Part conversion (Storage area =~ 19m²)
- c. Full conversion if kitchen is not absolutely needed (Storage area =~ 33m²)
- d. Move A/V area to under stairwell & free up area G37? (Storage area =~ 39m²)



3. Mezzanine floor in large exhibition Hall


The $\overline{4.6m}$ high ceiling height of the large exhibition hall allows for a mezzanine floor with storage. It could also serve as a viewing platform – a great view over hall events.

The support beams would not occupy a significant floor footprint (there are already in-floor power and A/V panels which will limit stalls and cubicles in this area anyway).



4. Upper level Staff room conversion

Reinstating the service elevator in the original location proposed by Brent Scott could link the large exhibition hall and the upper level floor. This is a significant floor space area of approx. 100m^2 that is much underutilized and not essential for daily operations.



5. Multiple conversion

The basement storage area and Upper level Staff room conversion could be combined to take advantage of a common service elevator. The elevator would access the basement and roof level storage areas and could provide double transfers in a single operation. This provides maximum storage area and movement efficiency.

The Memorial elements have been part of the building since 1957. They need to be returned.

The conversion of the existing chair storage area into the Memorial area is a cost effective and practical solution. It's secure, safe and sheltered – usable in any weather conditions. It's the best location for electronic media and providing education.

The conversion gives NCC an opportunity to remedy existing storage and operational issues.
